My sabbatical is just days away and I have been overwhelmed by the good wishes and assurances of prayer that I have already received. May-August may well see some big changes as restrictions are on the horizon of being lifted. One of my jobs in recent days has been to collate an interim preaching plan which sees some form of worship taking place in most churches at least twice a month, all services will require social distancing and face covering to be observed, still with no congregational singing.

Although we may be going in the right direction, we cannot be certain of what the destination will look like and whilst for many life seems to be returning back to normal, we must be aware that some are apprehensive, even fearful. So I would say that cautious optimism is the key but not forgetting the hope that we have in Jesus Christ.

As churches and as a Circuit we are undoubtedly in a season of change and opportunity; recognising what we have learnt from the past year, recognising where we are now: what we may need to let go of and we may need to embrace, and through it all listening to what the Holy Spirit is saying as we seek to be the people of God. I was struck by a quote that I discovered only yesterday. This is something that I will be reflecting on and praying through and I invite you to do this too.

"Yearning for a new way will not produce it. Only ending the old way can do that. You cannot hold onto the old all the while declaring that you want something new. The old will defy the new; the old will deny the new; the old will decry the new. There is only one way to bring in the new. You must make room for it."

As a circuit we are part of a larger body, the Nottingham and Derby District and changes will be taking place there too. Currently the Chair of the District (charged with pastoral and strategic leadership) is Revd Loraine Mellor. Loraine is sitting down (Methodist speak for retiring) in August 2022 and whilst the wider Methodist Church has conversations about what the best structure may be going forward, a Deputy Chair (which will be the full expression of a Chair) has been appointed. Andy is currently Superintendent of the Stamford Circuit, Deputy Chair of the Northampton District, and comes with many gifts.

Further to a joint church council I can now share that from 1st September the new name of this church family will be Hope Community Methodist Church. Please continue to pray for these churches as they travel this road.

Prayer is the very centre of all that we do and all that we are, and can I encourage you to pray for the life, witness and mission of the Circuit, the ministers, supernumeraries, circuit stewards, local preachers, all that make up your local church. I have shared this prayer before, but it is one that I pray regularly:

HOLY SPIRIT-THE PROMISE

Our Sunday Sermon | Reflections from Joel 2:28-32 | Revd. Peter Hibberts

hat is your experience of God the Holy Spirit? I call him God the Holy Spirit just to start off by asserting that we are studying here God himself. I place himself in italics just to show that God the Holy Spirit need not be confined to being masculine but shouldn't (in my humble opinion) be referred to as 'it' as we are talking about one of the persons of the Trinity not a thing. I'm excited about this short series (four weeks) leading up to and including pentecost because I've heard many folk in various studies during the last 12 months say that they don't know enough about the Holy Spirit, don't really understand him or how he works and moves. I must start by saying that I don't know enough about the Holy Spirit or understand enough about him either so I hope we're exploring and mining the depths of God's wonder and mystery together. I'd love to hear your thoughts and if you'd like to explore together look for the Zoom groups available below. The material covered here was the focus of 'Cliff Fest' (the celebration weekend of Cliff College) a number of years ago and I've been looking forward to using the published material with churches ever since. I hope you'll be challenged and blessed by it.

To begin with I want to address a potential fear that we may have. We can see the person of Jesus in the gospel, we are perhaps comfortable with God the father/creator and happy that we can imagine him as distant but a person of the trinity who is here in my private and personal space, convicting me, transforming me - that can be scary! In the Lion the Witch and the Wardrobe by C.S. Lewis, three children are journeying to meet Aslan (the Lion that represents God in the Chronicles of Narnia). Lucy, the youngest, doesn't know what to expect in meeting a Lion and asks, 'Is he safe?' The reply given by Mr Beaver is 'No, he's not safe, but he is good.' This is a beautiful reassurance that does not make the mistake of diminishing the power of God to become some fluffy pet. God the Holy Spirit is not 'safe' in a controlled and contained way but God only does good things, for you, for the church and for the world. If we are able to open ourselves up to the movement of God the Holy Spirit we may need to prepare ourselves for a white knuckle ride (which I know not everyone enjoys) but the ride will end in a place beyond our wildest dreams.

A further background point is that God the Holy Spirit is not a new thing. God the Holy Spirit is eternal as the entire trinity is. *He* can be seen moving at the very beginning of scripture, the Old Testament gives many accounts of 'God's Spirit' or the 'Spirit of the Lord' and todays passage is from around nine hundred years before Christ. The material I'm using for this series came from a book written by Samuel Chadwick around 100 years ago! This is not new but it does point to a change from specific acts of God's Spirit, a pouring out, an enduring presence of God available to ALL!

At the time when the prophet Joel spoke these words, Israel was in the grip of a massive plague - a plague of locusts in this instance. In the

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crisis Joel 'laments' (he expresses his deep sorrow for the situation) and calls the people to repent (to turn away from their mistakes) and then voices God's response (what is known as a prophecy or prophetic word). It's in this response from God that we locate ourselves today. In fact the promise of the Holy Spirit is a direct response to the human crisis. God first takes pity, then provides for them (Joel 2) and finally promises a time when 'God's Spirit' will be poured out in a transformative way.

What is your experience of promises? I'm mindful of the promises I made when I was ordained and even reflecting on the last 5 years of ministry I know I've made many mistakes. If I had my time again, I'd do it differently (with a different set of mistakes, no doubt). But God's promises are different. The Bible tells of how God keeps *his* promises; my own story tells me that God keeps *his* promises. You may also have stories of God's promises kept. Here there is a promise that beyond the presence of God's Spirit that we see in the Old Testament, there will be a pouring out!

Samuel Chadwick (former principal of Cliff College) asks, 'Do we believe in the Holy Spirit?' and then, 'If we do, what is the practical proof of our faith?' My friends, have you experienced a pouring out of the Holy Spirit in your life? Do you know the abiding presence of God in your life? If you haven't/don't then Joel is alerting you to a promise that God has made. It's your promise and mine! 'I will pour out my spirit on all flesh' (v28). It's a promise for now! 'those days' (v29) are the days we are living in (sometimes called the last days). We are already living post Acts 2 (the first pentecost) when the Holy Spirit was first poured out nearly 2,000 years ago (though we will celebrate it in a few weeks time). It's a promise of transformation! 'Your sons and daughters will proclaim my message; your old people will dream dreams' (v28) (I'll let you locate yourself in that!) It's a promise that is for us, for the good of the church and for the good of the world. 'But all who ask the LORD for help will be saved.' (v32)

I don't know how that makes you feel but I think that it should be stirring your heart. If you've already known the pouring out of God the Holy Spirit then I think you'll agree that our church really needs more of *him*. If you've never experienced a pouring out then perhaps it's time to claim that promise.

As we look back in the Bible we can see God's spirit at work. As we look forward to Pentecost we can see the potential and power that the Holy Spirit can bring. When we look at our communities and our churches we can see the need for revival. We are uniquely poised in the Christian year between Easter and Pentecost, many of us are uniquely poised between the promise in Joel and the fulfilment in Acts. As we journey towards Pentecost let's make our prayer a simple one for our own lives, for our churches, for our communities, for our nation, for our world: **'Come Holy Spirit.'**

Study groups





FAMILY ACTIVITIES

In today's reading we've explored God's promise in Joel 2 to pour out his Spirit on all people. When we read the account of Pentecost we see that prophecy fulfilled. WOW!

I wonder how many other promises you can think of as a family that God made in the bible and kept? See if you can make a list. Here are a couple of bible stories you could look at to get you started...

- Noah (Genesis 9:14-15)
- Abram and Sarah (Genesis 12:1-3, 18:1-15 and 21:1-5)

Write on a piece of paper:

"The Lord is faithful to all His promises and loving to all he has made."

Psalms 145:13

Look at the piece of paper with the bible verse and read it together. Explain that God's promises aren't just for Abraham or Noah. Here is a promise from God that you can keep.

Draw something you really love on the paper. You can draw yourself if you want. Thank God for keeping his promises no matter how outrageous. Thank God for loving us and ask God to help us believe in His promises to us.

The Bible is constantly reminding us that when God makes a promise, He is faithful to keep it. How does that make you feel?

Look at the passage in Joel 2: 28-29 again. God promises to pour out His Spirit on ALL people. 'Sons and daughters will prophesy'... you are all someone's son or daughter so you are included in this passage. It doesn't matter if you are old or young - God promised to pour out His Spirit on ALL people so that includes YOU! We will explore what that means and what a spirit-filled life might look like over the coming weeks.

Rainbow Prayer

If you've got paints at home, try saying the words of this prayer as you finger paint a rainbow:

'Thank you God that you keep your promises.'
