John Malnutt and Chris Briggs have enabled me to be braver and become an evangelist for GOD, whilst enjoying a monthly catch up with my friends and other Christians.

I love Young evangelists and it has really helped me grow as a Christian, but most of all I can help other people to know the incredible love of GOD that I know.

Mark's Gospel - Bible Month Part 2 Mission and Boundaries

Online Circuit Service Sermon | Romans 8:37-39 | Rev Peter Hibberts

ast week we began our study in Mark with questions about 'Mission and Identity' - who is this Jesus? (You can find Peter Bates' message from last week on the circuit website and as part of last week's service on our YouTube channel.)

I know what you're thinking though, how can we be in the second of a series in Mark's gospel when I've chosen to focus on a passage in Romans? Hopefully that will become clear. I want to invite you to read Mark 4:1-8:21 in it's entirety though it's far too big to include in a service! For now, I intend to bring themes out from across these chapters but Romans 8:37-39 pretty much sums it up! In the second of our four week series on Mark's gospel we consider the Mission of Jesus and Boundaries.

I'll be honest with you, there are few things I hate more than boundaries. The idea that someone only receives or participates in something or has a right to something if they live within a boundary is one I struggle with. On the other hand I love the organisation, 'Medicines Sans Frontiers' (sometimes known in Britain as 'Doctors without Borders'). The reality is that our borders are human constructions that diseases (not least COVID-19) don't respect and they shouldn't limit our ability to help. In chapters 4-8 of Mark's gospel we see a God who also knows no boundaries and are challenged to a borderless faith and an inclusive church!

First we encounter the parable of the sower (4:1-9). I know what you may be thinking, in this parable there are clear boundaries - there is a path, rocky ground, thorny ground and good soil. As if that's not bad enough, Jesus goes on to say that for those 'outside,' the parables are there that they might listen but not understand! Does Jesus want some to be in and some to be out? Of course not. Whilst leading inevitably causes some to follow and some to not, the aim of the leader is surely to be followed! Look again at the sower (the one who sows the word). Does he choose the landing place of the seed? Not at all - the seed is scattered indiscriminately! Indeed, wherever the crop grows it will be harvested. This is a parable of no boundaries, no discrimination and challenge for us that although we know not everyone will respond in the way we'd like, we too must share God's love indiscriminately and let God be in control of the harvest.

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The borderless God we serve doesn't stop there either. As Mark continues we have many miracles of identity. (Miracles that tell us something about the character and identity of our borderless God, seen in Jesus.)

We have the calming of the storm (4:35-41) showing us that the laws of nature are not boundaries to God. We have the healing of the haemophiliac (5:24-34), which in a time of blood being a source of uncleanliness and social taboo shows that social norms and prejudices are not boundaries to God's love and healing. Then we have the feeding of the 5,000 (6:30-44) and 4,000 (8:1-10) which demonstrates that our meagre resource will not thwart the work of God - he will multiply! When Jesus walks on water (6:45-52) he proves that seemingly insurmountable obstacles will not keep us from God's presence. Jesus casts out the demon from the Syrophoenician woman's daughter (7:24-30) showing that nationality or race are no boundary to God's power. And of course we have the Girl restored to life (5:21-23...35-43) showing that even death is not a barrier to God's love and power.

Are you getting the picture? The more we see of the person of Jesus, the more the boundaries, borders, limitations melt away!

What's holding you back? Perhaps it's illness, self-confidence, resources, locations or even this dreaded pandemic. Let me tell you, none of these things, though they may hold us back in life, holds back God's love, God's presence or God's blessings.

The passage I focussed on initially says this beautifully:

"And I am convinced that nothing can ever separate us from God's love. Neither death nor life, neither angels nor demons, neither our fears for today nor our worries about tomorrow--not even the powers of hell can separate us from God's love." Romans 8:38 (NLT)

This folks is who Jesus is. Jesus is the indiscriminate sower; the laws of nature breaker; the social taboo smasher, the resource multiplier, the race and nationality defier, and the death destroyer! **He is the boundary breaker!**

The most important thing I can tell you, about who Jesus, is that he is God with skin on, come to walk amongst us; the same God who flung stars into space, who surrendered to cruel nails on the cross in order to overcome every barrier and make a way to God the creator for *all* who want it.

Let's step back, in awe and give all we are to the God who

has given all, wants all and can do all with us.

Lord, I lift up my heart to you in love and adoration, and praise you for your greatness. You are the great and mighty King and all glory belongs to you. Words cannot describe how awesome you are. There is no other god that can be compared to you and there is none above you. You are the Creator of heaven and earth, and everything belongs to you. My heart bursts with joy when I think of you. Come, move with us as we live and worship you. Come by your Holy Spirit wherever we are and fill us as we worship you.



Families activities...

Read the story of the Parable of the Sower from Mark's gospel, or watch an animated version here:



Divide a piece of paper into four quadrants. Can you remember what soils Jesus talked about in his story?

In each quadrant draw or crayon a different soil: path, thin and stony, weedy, good. Try to make the quadrants very different – really thick brown for the good soil, and thinner, sandy yellow in the others. When you've drawn the soils, spread glue over the picture and stick some seeds on. You could also glue some feathers onto the path to represent birds.

Talk about the different soils and what they represent.

Response activity

Using air-drying clay or play dough (or make salt dough if you want some messy fun - there are many recipes online!), roll the dough out and cut it into the shape of a heart. Stick a large seed in the middle (sunflower seeds are perfect) and keep it as a reminder that our hearts are like the soil from the parable of the sower - we want them to be good soil so that the seed can grow.

Alternatively, cut a large heart shape out of a piece of kitchen roll. Place it on a plate and sprinkle the heart with water and add cress seeds. As the cress grows over the next week or so into a heart shape, remember that God wants our hearts to listen to what he says.
