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Partnering in Mission, Supporting One Another, Journeying Together The report from the Circuit Vision Team written by Rev Peter Hibberts

ou may be aware that the Circuit Meeting asked for a Circuit Vision Team be set up to look at the vision for the Circuit moving beyond Covid times. I have to say that it has been a joy to chair this team and has been a really exciting journey where we have prayerfully and carefully waited on God for direction and I feel convinced that we have heard God's voice.

The team consisted of three circuit stewards (Ann Lyne, Jill Meakin and Stephen Dando), the three ministers (Nathan Falla, Peter Bates and Peter Hibberts) and three church members from around the circuit (Jenny Everett, Jan Wright and David Watson). The Vision Team have been supported by Nigel Pimlott from the Eastern Learning Network Region.

The two page report would be too big to include in its entirety here but you can find it on the Circuit website (see below) or receive it by request - I think it's worth a read! In particular we imagined a circuit that aimed to **encourage**, **excite** and **enable** the churches in their mission and was particularly focussed on '**Partnering in Mission**', '**Supporting one another**' and '**Journeying in Discipleship**'. This may sound like nothing new but some of the ideas for the shape of this (which would come in at a more strategic planning stage) are certainly more radical. We felt that at a time when all of our churches are vulnerable we are stronger together. We are imagining a circuit experience that is more of a family, better connected, more supportive and more focussed on our mission; a circuit that gathers to do what is done best when gathered and scatters to do what is best done in our localities. A circuit which could help us to better reach out in certain specified geographical locations; where some of the benefits might include high quality different forms of worship, systematic teaching, a concentration of resources, a reduction of our carbon footprint, and a joyous celebration of God's enabling Spirit to the encouragement of us all.

The next step is for the full report to be received by the Circuit Meeting on June 21st and for this report to be made available to all, across our churches for prayerful testing and discussion before further discussions in the Autumn Circuit Meeting (in September). I commend the report to all (available from the circuit website: <u>https://www.newarkandsouthwellmethodist.org.uk/newsroom/circuit-vision-teamreport.html</u>) and ask that we all surround this in prayer in the coming weeks and months. Mark's Gospel - Bible Month Part 3 THE TRANSFIGURATION

Online Circuit Service Sermon | Mark 9:2-9 | Rev Peter Bates

The section of Mark's gospel that we have been asked to look at, includes blind people being given their sight, a boy being restored to health and Jesus welcoming children to him to be blessed. Jesus also gives the disciples an insight into the Scriptures and what they will face into the future. And in the middle of all this is the story of the transfiguration. In a sense it encapsulates the three chapters we are looking at – people having their eyes opened by Jesus. The transfiguration is about the three disciples accompanying Jesus up the mountain, and then seeing Jesus in a completely new way.

The first part of this section we are looking at is struggle. It wasn't easy for the disciples to follow Jesus up the mountain, there would have been rough patches along the way to navigate, there would have been steep inclines. For the blind men It would have been a tough life before they were healed by Jesus, and what about the boy and his father. The father would have been desperate for his son to be healed, and the boy must have feared for his life, as the fits he had threw him into all kinds of danger. Jesus' disciples had to wrestle with the thought that their teacher may be taken away from them, as well as their confusion as to whether Jesus was the long-awaited Messiah.

We too, have our own troubles. We have just endured eighteen months of fear and uncertainty. For some people, this may not have caused them too much stress, but for others, it has been a terrible time to endure. We can think of those who have lost loved ones, and those who are suffering from long-term Covid. We also think of those who have suffered financially, and those who have lost their businesses and their careers. And I am sure there are others who I have not mentioned. Now we have to climb the mountain to get to the 'new normal', to find a place where we can settle and reflect on what has happened to ourselves, our family and our friends. And we can be assured that God has been with us, and will continue to be with us in all the uncertainty that we face.

I hope that as we come through this experience, we can see our world in a new way. We have missed so many things that we have taken for granted, let us value and appreciate these things, and see them in a new light. Sometimes we have to climb the mountain, we have to go through troubled times, so that we can see God in a fresh light. In the struggle, God is able to work within us to bring us to the place he wants us to be. The disciples struggled up the mountain, and then they were able to take a

breath and relax. But before they knew it, Jesus was transfigured before their eyes. They were stunned. Peter broke the silence with what he thought was a practical suggestion. He could visibly see Elijah and Moses in front of him, they were real, and Peter decided that they should make three shelters for Jesus and his guests.

Have we been stunned in our Christian life, when God has done something amazing? Whether we have been healed or witnessed someone else being healed. Has God done something profound in our life or our church? Perhaps God has transformed a person or a situation in a way that we never thought would be possible.

Just think what it must have been like for blind Bartimaeus to receive his sight, not just physically but also spiritually. Bartimaeus had faith, otherwise, he wouldn't have been shouting at the top of his voice to try and get Jesus' attention. But just imagine what it was like for Bartimaeus to see, and to see Jesus. The father whose son suffered from fits, brought his son to Jesus' disciples, but they couldn't heal him. Just as the father was beginning to lose faith, Jesus appears, and restores the boy to full health. Not only has the father got his son back but his own faith has been restored as well.

Peter, James and John saw Jesus transfigured before them on the mountain top. It had a profound affect on them. This experience would be a tremendous help to them in the weeks and months ahead. These three disciples would be the ones to lead the early church through uncertain times.

What has God got in store for us? We may have to climb the mountain to get to where God wants us to be. Are we willing to struggle? To face the disappointments in life, to face the fear of failure, to face the feelings of inadequacy. To put our faith in God, and in despair ask for help to believe. Are we willing to shout at the top of our voices, so that God can see that we mean business with him? And are we willing to receive our sight, to want with all our heart to see Jesus?

Are we willing to face heartache and pain, so that we can trust God with everything we have? And are we humble enough to take a back seat when praise is being lavished on others? God wants to reveal himself afresh to you. Will you open your spiritual eyes and hearts so that you can see Jesus and receive him into your hearts?

Blind Bartimaeus struggled through life and received his sight and so much more. The father whose son had an evil spirit was shown the power of restoration, of his boy and of his own faith. The disciples struggled up the mountain and were overwhelmed by the vision they saw. Their lives were changed because of an encounter with the Lord. How would you like your life to be changed today by the living God? **Amen**

Families activities...

Family Activity 1: Transfiguration

We often call this story in the Bible the 'transfiguration' which means a complete change of form of appearance.

Play a "what's changed" game together. Everybody should close their eyes while one person changes something in the room. It could be closing the curtains or swapping two pictures over or putting on a hat! They should tell everybody when they can open their eyes. Who can spot what has changed the fastest?

Family Activity 2: "Let's build a tent!"

When Peter saw Jesus transfigured, he panicked and didn't know what to do. I wonder what the other disciples thought of his idea that they set up tents! Why not build your own tent to hang out in as a family. You could use sheets or blankets combined with furniture or anything you have handy.

While you are in your tent, why not read and explore some of these stories from the lives of Moses and Elijah. You might like to look for similarities and differences between the stories and the story we explored today.

Exodus 33 v 7-23: Moses sets up a tent where he can meet with God and has an amazing encounter when he asks to see God's glory.

1 Kings 19 v 1-18: Elijah encounters an angel who gives him breakfast and then meets with God on a mountain.

Active Transformation

What are some of the things that we can do in our own lives to grow in knowledge of God and relationship with Him? Here are some ideas for you to try:

Active Study

Find today's story (Mark 9:2-9) in your own Bible and read it again, ask God to help you find something new that you didn't think about the first time you read the story.

Find one thing from the story that you can apply to your own life and the way you live for God.

Active Prayer

Take some time to pray and ask God to help you change you life to be even more like him. Why not try these keep fit, active prayers.

- Do 10 star jumps as you jump ask God to help you reach out to others and share his love.
- Stretch your arms up as high as you can ask God to help you connect with him more this week.
- Do ten push ups ask God to help you build and strengthen your faith
