Freedom

Online Circuit Service Sermon | Acts 16:16-34 | Revd Nathan Falla

Have you ever felt trapped? Maybe you have locked a door, and found it very difficult to unlock again, or a lift has stopped suddenly and you wonder if the doors are going to open? Maybe you have felt trapped by a relationship, by tradition, views, responsibilities or expectations?

Our reading this week gives the account of Paul and Silas in prison as recorded in Acts by Luke; the miracle and wonder of chains being broken and prisoners being set free, but others were also being set free, not from physical chains but from invisible metaphorical chains and by being set free entering new life through Christ.

Paul and Silas have reached Philippi in Greece, they have reached Europe. They stayed in Philippi for a couple of weeks and as they were going to the place of prayer saw a woman, a slave-girl who could tell the future and who made lots of money for her owner. The woman would cry out that Paul and Silas were "servants of the most high God, who are telling you the way to be saved." Culturally this was not a problem, as salvation was a popular subject for conversation. But this occurred a number of times and Paul slowly became troubled.

Was he troubled or annoyed because he did not think that she was helping the spread of the gospel message? Was he troubled or annoyed because he could see that this woman was caught, trapped, being used and exploited for her skills? Was he troubled or annoyed because he knew that the source of the woman's ability, was evil and not good?

We do not know why Paul was troubled or annoyed; it could have been one, a combination of these reasons or for a different reason. But what we do know is that Paul's distress made him turn around and put a stop to it. He commanded the spirit to come out of the woman "In the name of Jesus Christ I command you to come out of her!"

Paul saw that the evil spirit had power over the woman, he saw that the owner was holding the girl captive and he set her free. The slave girl's owners however, did not appreciate the transformation and brought Paul and Silas before the magistrate, which led to them being flogged and ended up with them being put in prison.

In prison, Paul and Silas are put in the innermost cell. In pain from the flogging, with aching limbs and lacerated backs, somehow at midnight they burst into prayer and song, praising God rather than moaning. Suddenly there is an earthquake, the whole jail shakes and shudders and prison doors burst open.

The jailer fears the worst when he wakes up, he is personally responsible for the prisoners and if they have all escaped, his life is not worth living; failure would be paid for by his life. In desperation he was going to commit suicide, but then Paul shouts out "don't harm yourself, we are all here!"

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The jailer cannot believe the situation and falls down before Paul and Silas asking what he must to do be saved. Paul and Silas reply: "Believe in the Lord Jesus, and you will be saved – you and your household." The jailor recognised that something was missing in his life, he saw Paul and Silas and in them was something different; there was joy, deep joy and a sense of hope, certain hope.

The jailer takes Paul and Silas and nurses their wounds, then the jailer and his whole family are baptised as a response. They have truly experienced that life begins with Christ.

Our passage from Acts reminds us of the transforming power of God which brings new life. The slave girl is set free from the evil that is dominating her life. The jailer becomes the one who needs to be freed who needs to be released, and the lives of his whole family have been transformed.

In this world today there are people in physical chains imprisoned because of their faith, there are people caught in slavery who long to be free, there are people even in British society who do not feel free to be the people who they feel God calls them to be.

God offers to us all new life in Christ. We have in our reading the reminder of the transforming power of God to free us from the chains that bind us, the slave girl is free, the jailer is free, and we can be free.

What chains are binding you and me? We may not be in physical chains, but what areas in our lives are preventing us from being fully the people that God calls us to be, from fully experiencing the love and grace that God offers to us all, from living life to the full, experiencing new life in Christ? Anything that restricts, inhibits or binds us can be like a chain.

Chains that bind us can be the wrongs that we have done; the things that we have said, thought or done which hurt us, other people and affect our relationship with God, that we haven't surrendered to God.

Chains that bind us can be guilt or hurt from the past, the prejudice or false stereotypes that we face, which can make us feel unlovable and unworthy; preventing us from experiencing the fullness of God's love through the people around us.

Chains that bind us can be addiction, selfishness, and pride. Chains that bind us can be failing to respond to God and following the way that he calls.

Jesus died for us, so that the chains that bind us can be broken, can be destroyed. The cross defeated death, defeated sin, and equipped and enabled by God's Holy Spirit we can be transformed and experience the new life in Christ.

Jesus offers to all a new beginning, to start afresh, claiming the promises of God and recognising that the chains that bind us and that bind our world can be broken in Jesus' name.

In Christ we are set free.
Through Christ we are forgiven.
Amen. Thanks be to God.

We ask this in the name of Jesus through whom we are truly set free. Amen.
