God's love moves us to share with those we do not agree with. The Spirit enables us to work with those who we would not choose to work with: And yet, in all this, if we are willing, God enables us to genuinely love those we journey with. Being a Christian is about love and forgiveness, and the more we go on journeying with others the more we learn to love and forgive. Each one of us as a Christians is called to serve and to express God's love. I think being in a church enables us to develop as a Christian, we learn to accept people as they are, and they learn to accept us as we are. Of course, there must be room to grow and change but this is all done in the context of a loving community. It is up to us to lead by example and show people what a loving community is like.

# LOVE THE LORD

Sunday Sermon | Mark 12:28-34 | Rev Peter Bates

he answer which Jesus gives to the question the teacher of the law asks is very interesting because it starts with, "Hear O Israel. The Lord our God, the Lord is one." Jesus speaks of unity, of oneness, completeness. The God we worship is one, and yet we know within that oneness there is the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit. They are one but we struggle to understand because we cannot comprehend unity which is expressed by God. The nearest I have come to understanding the oneness of God is when I watched the film, 'The Shack'. The unity of God is so beautifully expressed in that film, and it has helped me when I think about the Trinity.

It is this unity that I want to put across this morning, because unity is so important to us. God dwells in unity. When we work together, I believe that God blesses the work. In ecumenical terms it is not always easy but I believe that we witness to the world that we are together, that we are one in Christ.

Let us look at what Jesus says in verse 30. "Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind and with all your strength." If we think about a whole person, we think of these four aspects which make up a person. We have known for a while that to preach to a person you need to minister to the whole person not just the soul, the spiritual part of a person. What do these aspects mean for us when we read these words of Jesus. "Love the Lord your God with all your heart. I think of heart as passion, our emotions. Do we get passionate about God? Perhaps when we are singing our favourite hymns our heart swells with emotion, but what about when the preacher has chosen hymns that don't suit us, do we still sing passionately, with all our heart?

What about in our prayers, when we read the Bible, the quiet times we have, when we share with other Christians, are we passionate about our faith? Jesus didn't say, "Be passionate about God when it suits you." I think Jesus meant that we should be passionate all the time, even though we will not always show it.

Spiritually, do we maintain a healthy balance in our life? Is the spiritual side of our life on equal terms as the physical side? We need to worship God 'in spirit and in truth'. Most of us live on land for most of our lives. We feel a bit unsure ISSUE 55 27-10-21

of ourselves when we are in water. If we have gone swimming in the sea or at our local swimming pool, we need to prepare ourselves. It perhaps takes us a short time to get used to being in the water but after a while we feel comfortable. Just imagine if you only went swimming once a year. How strange would it feel to be in the water after such a long time? It is the same with our spiritual life, if we spend most of our time dwelling in the physical world it is much harder then to dwell in the spiritual. We need to attune our bodies to not only use our physical senses but also to use our spiritual senses. To see a beautiful sun set or a sunrise, we see through our physical eyes but we also need to be aware of our spiritual senses, so that we can thank God and praise him.

Our bodies are delicate instruments, we need to look after them and be aware when the balance isn't right. We need to know ourselves and be sensitive to when our bodies are asking us for a rest or some food. We also need to be aware of our spiritual needs, when our soul is asking us to spend more time with God.

How do we use our minds? God has given us this amazing ability to take in information and use it. Do we use our minds for God or do we focus on ourselves? It is the same with our strength. Do we use our energy our abilities, our strength to help others or do we use it for ourselves? There is nothing wrong with reading a book or spending time on the internet, these are pleasurable things to do. But if we spend all our time reading books or all our time on the internet, we need to think about how we can serve others. God allows us to have time for ourselves. In the very command which Jesus spoke about to the teacher of the law, he says, "Love your neighbour as yourself." If we don't love ourselves, how can we show real love to our neighbour? It is a two-fold challenge. We need to get the balance right. If all our attention is on our neighbour and helping them, we will wear ourselves out and have no time for ourselves. If all our attention is on ourselves then we will have no time for our neighbour. We need to look after our neighbour as well as ourselves.

In all this, the point is we need to get the balance right. Jesus first of all acknowledged Gods unity, he then speaks about our four-fold responsibility to God. If we get the balance right here, we have every chance of getting the balance right with loving and caring about ourselves and also being aware of our neighbour's needs. Amen
