A prayer/year of reconciliation.

It's traditional in many Methodist congregations to begin a new calendar year with a covenant service. If you're not from a Methodist background you may not be familiar with the Methodist Covenant prayer, and if you're new to faith you may not be familiar with the concept of a covenant relationship (I'll unpack these a little more in the message, below, and when I lead this year's covenant services). If you haven't come across them, they are well worth investing time in. The Covenant Prayer and Covenant service (the service in which the prayer is framed as a recommitment) are very special points in the Methodist year.

The origins of the prayer and the service begin in the mid eighteenth century with John Wesley, the founder of the Methodist Church and his adaptations from other works in the Puritan tradition. The prayer and the service have evolved since then but they were designed to be deeply pastoral (about our relationship with each other - this year all of the membership cards will be on the altar in the services I lead) and about spiritual guidance (allowing God to direct our paths).

This year, if I'm honest, I approach covenant with a heavy heart. My heart has felt heavy for some time and, though this is for many reasons, I cannot avoid the feeling that COVID has damaged our relationships. Whilst some relationships and connections have grown or deepened, COVID has forced us to be more distant from others and our closeness has been affected by not being in as regular, in-person, fellowship. There will no doubt be some folk you have not seen in this time, not worshipped alongside for nearly two years. Folk who you were close to, served alongside, were called to serve God with and now feel distant from; friends.

I approach a month of in-person covenant services knowing that with COVID prevalent again, many will feel it too unsafe to be in the church building together. We may well be praying the covenant prayer with fewer people around us and feel less together than we would ordinarily. That heaviness of heart, for me at least, is one of compassion. I desperately want to know that fellowship again (with all those who I dearly miss) and so for me **the covenant prayer will be a prayer of reconciliation**. It will be a year of asking God to guide me as a minister to the direction *he* wants me to face and who he wants me to minister to. It will be about how God wants me to build bridges, repair relationships and foster positive working together in the coming year to rebuild together.

I feel like there is a mountain to climb in some places; COVID has separated us and the anxieties that have come alongside it have caused further damage both personally and inter-personally. We've seen others as a threat (and been told to distance ourselves) when in reality we are sisters and brothers whom God wants to draw ever closer. It is a mountain that we have to climb, but as Isaiah 40 tells us, as the LORD comes,

"Every valley shall be lifted up, and every mountain and hill be made low; the uneven grounds will become level, and the rough places a plain."

It is only by God's miraculous work and the movement of his spirit that the church works.

The Church... a marriage made in heaven? Covenant Service Message | Ephesians 5:21-33 | Rev Peter Hibberts

Trecently led a wedding blessing service following a registrar wedding of some friends of ours. Both parties were divorcess and had come together with a blended family. They tied the knot beautifully and it was a privilege and a pleasure to lead a short service and ask God's blessing on their relationship. But I did struggle to write the short message I preached. Firstly, I felt ill-qualified to preach on marriage. (I don't feel particularly good at it and am very grateful to my wife for putting up with me!) And secondly, to preach on how wonderful marriage is in the presence of two people who have known the difficulties it can also bring risked being trite.

In this edition, we focus on the Covenant Prayer (see below for the full prayer). 'John Wesley's original prayer involved taking Christ as, "my Head and Husband, for better for worse, for richer for poorer, for all times and conditions, to love, honour and obey thee before others, and this to the death." He saw the relationship with God in Covenant as being like marriage between human beings.' (Methodist Church Website) I'm inclined to agree on more than one level. Firstly the marriage relationship is one of covenant, a relationship of submission and service - each other's needs to prefer, but also it's a very difficult one and church can be difficult.

The passage I've chosen for today is a powerful one. If lived out, it's transformative for the way we do church. I do need to just cover off a couple of pitfalls though. It's a problematic passage for many too. I don't want to spend too much time going into issues of gender equality as I think this passage potentially tells us more about the church and Christ than it does about gender rolls inside or outside of marriage. To sidestep this potential distraction from what God might be saying, I would simply emphasise verse 21. "Be subject to one another out of reverence to Christ." This is universal. This is not about race, gender, social status, or anything else that humanity wrongly uses to rank folk. It is a great leveller. It calls for equality and mutuality in a way that I don't think humanity (and certainly not human institutions) have ever fully grasped. Try not to focus on the problematic references as we unpack, let it all be prefaced and underwritten by that universal mutuality. I want then to focus on a few key concepts here, from key phrases in the text:

It's about mutuality. (v21) I've already covered this off a little but it can't be understated. I think this is something that Methodism understands really well. There is no singular priesthood (one person as a priest) in Methodism, instead we believe in the priesthood of all believers. This, in my understanding, means that there is no one person who is a go-between for us and God but we all collectively share that priesthood. That means it is our collective responsibility to present the church to God 'in splendour, without spot or wrinkle.' We are to work together, lay (those who don't wear a collar) and ordained (those who do!) in whatever way God is calling us. This is difficult. We live in a world that organises us hierarchically by rank and considers some more important than others - the church does not, and we sometimes need to remind ourselves of that. The beauty of our church family compared to a workplace (where some may find themselves senior to others, or feel passed over/inferior) is that in Church we are all equal... no-one outranks anyone else.

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It is founded on love, God's love. (v25) This is key. Without love for one-another we will come unstuck. When a marriage falls out of love, it is doomed. As long as the couple love one-another, it has a chance. It's love that allows for the tension and friction to be passed by, for forgiveness to happen. This is a separate message really but I Corinthians 13 is a great place to see this love unpacked and in my Bible this passage is headed, 'The Gift of Love' which tells us that this love is only possible because God has loved us first (I John 4:19).

We must love others as we love ourselves. (v28) This is also key and it's a double edged sword. We must love ourselves. Self-loathing can be very damaging to our relationships. It takes great self-confidence to trust and to forgive. Our love for others stems from our identity in Christ, as loved by him, which allows us to love ourselves and therefore love others. It's much harder to love others if we see them as a threat (perhaps stemming from self-doubt) and when folk hurt us, we need to hear what Christ says about us in order to let that hurt go, forgive, and continue to love them. If we allow that love to die then we will always struggle with church. Many have left the church because 'the church' has hurt them (which is often shorthand for someone in church hurting them). We are all human and we will hurt each other, our only hope is to let Christ's love flow into and through these hurts for forgiveness and reconciliation.

It is a great mystery. (v32) Apologies, this is a bit of a catch-all (and maybe it was for St Paul when he wrote the letter to the Ephesians!). To be honest, beyond the advice given, I'm still working out what this looks like for Church. I've grown up in the Methodist Church, as the son of a minister, and have seen its best and its worst. In some ways I wonder at how this un-viable, mess of an institution is still going. I've seen folk hurt, been hurt, and hurt folk (for which I am truly sorry). And yet this body of believers stemming from twelve ordinary people is still growing (even in countries that have made it illegal). It's a mystery. If I'm honest I don't even know what God will do with the churches in the circuit where I'm called to lead in the next twelve months - that too is a mystery. But I do know that God has called me here, God has a plan and it's a good one. I may not be in my comfort zone but I'm content to trust. I invite everyone who can screw their courage to the sticking place to stand with me and follow it wherever it goes.

It's done out of reverence to Christ. (v21) And this is our great motivation. Reverence is a funny word. It comes from the Greek phobos, where we get fear. It's translated here (in the NRSV) as reverence because it's not about intimidation but a healthy knowing about the power of Christ. It's perhaps better translated as 'sense of awe'. In the presence of Christ, we are so awe-struck that we are compelled to behave in a certain way. I want to end on this and point towards the Covenant Prayer. It's a challenge. It's difficult. If you mean it. But in actual fact, it's simply asking us to emulate Christ. Christ who could have prayed this prayer prior to coming to Earth, prior to starting his ministry, prior to walking to the cross. In his act of self-emptying, self-sacrificing, self-giving Christ epitomises the Covenant Prayer and it is out of awe for what Christ has done for us that we are compelled to self-empty, self-sacrifice, self-give.

Join me in this prayer. Let go of all that hinders you being church and be church - the body of Christ, the hope this world needs, for God's glory and all of our salvation. **Amen.**

Prayer of approach

Heavenly Father,

Wherever we are as we worship you today, may you reveal yourself to us.

As we approach you and turn our eyes heavenward may you unite us in worship and connect us by your spirit.

May you speak to us today as only you can. May you help us to hold the experiences that have brought us to where we are now in the light of your love, comfort us as we pause from our journey in this turbulent world and strengthen us for the journey ahead

May you be glorified in the praise we offer through Christ our Lord. Amen.

I am no longer my own but yours. Put me to what you will, rank me with whom you will; put me to doing, put me to suffering; let me be employed for you, or laid aside for you, exalted for you, or brought low for you; let me be full, let me be empty, let me have all things, let me have nothing: I freely and wholeheartedly yield all things to your pleasure and disposal. And now, glorious and blessed God, Father, Son and Holy Spirit, you are mine and I am yours. So be it. And the covenant now made on earth, let it be ratified in heaven.'
