What is unity? Revd Nathan Falla

I don't believe that unity means uniformity! As people we are all different; we look different, we like different things and we will have different gifts; some will be practical, others will be creative, some will be thinkers, others will be doers. It would be a very boring world, if we were all the same! Our differences are what make us special, and are not a reason why we cannot get along.

If we translate this to the Church, our local churches, our Circuit, our national denominations and the global Church then we are not the same either, however there can be unity in our diversity, and diversity in our unity. The week of 18th-25th January is set aside as The Week of Prayer for Christian unity, but what should we be praying about?

Paul writes in his first letter to the church in Corinth, chapter 12, giving the illustration of the body; the body made of many parts each with a part to play, and if we were all the same, then the body would look very strange indeed and the body just could not function! We need one another, the rich tapestry of diversity that we may truly be the body of Christ! Yes, we may do things slightly differently, we may not agree about everything, but we are one, we can learn from one another and appreciate one another, because we are family!

I had the privilege of training to be a Methodist minister in Cambridge and to be part of the Theological Federation. The Cambridge Theological Federation includes Anglican, Methodist, Orthodox, Roman Catholic and United Reformed institutions as members and both the Cambridge Centre for Christianity Worldwide and the Woolf Institute for the study of relations between Jews, Christians and Muslims as associate members.

The federation motto is: *Roots Down, Walls down* and for me this was best evidenced in the fortnightly Federation Worship and helped me to understand both how broad the church family is, but also how similar we are and our shared heritage. It helped me to more fully appreciate why I had chosen to be a part of the Methodist Church.

I greatly value being part of the Methodist Church which is a diverse family, that can hold different interpretations of the Bible in tension. I also believe that the wider church is all the richer because of the presence of the Methodist Church.

When I think of unity I think that there is more that holds us together than that drives us apart. The important thing is that we always listen with respect and acknowledge that although we may not all agree, we can all love God and love one another. We need to be authentic, recognising our diversity yet we are all one in Jesus Christ.

I hope we will never say, I don't need you.

Hard pressed on every side

Online Circuit Service Sermon | Reading 2 Corinthians 4:5-12 Revd Peter Hibberts

Perhaps we shouldn't be surprised with the way the last two years has gone but I'm encountering a lot more folk in crisis at the moment. In the past week I've found myself alongside three different folk in end of life care and many more folk who are struggling with work, health or relationships. It's a privilege to journey alongside folk in difficult times. St Paul describes the folk he wrote to in the first century AD (and us) as 'hard pressed on every side' and I have to say that's how it seems right now.

How do you feel right now? Are you 'hard pressed on every side'? If you are then I believe God wants you to hear the words of the bible passage above.

In this passage Paul describe his readers as 'Jars of Clay'. In Paul's time everyone would have had many 'jars of clay' in their houses as they were inexpensive and very versatile. A jar of clay could be used for anything from a kitchen utensil to a receptacle for the toilet. (Though I hope they had two separate ones for those varying functions!)

The analogy is beautiful. Firstly the way these jars were so widespread speaks of how many of us are in the same situation. You know, you're not alone in your struggles. Paul wrote to a church persecuted, challenged, finding life difficult. He wrote to human beings for whom life was tough. He could be writing these words to us. He captures our fragility beautifully. Being Christians doesn't make us suddenly superhuman, made of different materials that somehow withstand the world better. We may be in different boats and our contexts and experiences are unique, but remember: we're all in the same storm.

Sometimes I feel that fragile, like the smallest thing could tip me over the edge. I'd had a particularly difficult week leading up to a week last Thursday. I'd been slightly behind the pace for days, not keeping up with the workload or family life particularly well. I jumped in the car and rushed, having left a little late, for a school assembly in one of my villages, worried that I might not make it in time. I didn't speed, I hasten to add. (That journey doesn't allow speeding because there's always someone on your route who you're following, invariably below the speed limit!)

I got to a roundabout and it was busy, very few chances to go. Then there was large chance - enough for the person in front and, if I was quick, me too! I kept close and as they pulled away I followed. Except they didn't pull away. They had obviously been distracted or thought better of it

but they moved and then stopped and I inevitably didn't, well - I did when I ran into the back of them. I have to say that was the last straw - I audibly screamed in the car (at myself - totally my fault). I looked up to see if I could see the damage to the car in front and it looked like nothing had happened. Then they pulled off and carried on their journey as if nothing had happened. When I eventually got my space on the roundabout I continued but never caught up with the car I hit. It hadn't stopped anywhere ahead despite turning the same way as me. A minor miracle (as was the fact that our car was undamaged save for a cracked licence plate which is easily replaced!!) Fortunately neither my car nor their's was made of clay!! (I'm contemplating whether the lack of damage may even be a miracle!)

We're all only ever a few circumstances away from crisis, tragedy, even breakdown. We manage to create a thin veneer, while we can, to show the world we're okay and at times we do thrive and it's not just a veneer, but actually we're all made of clay, we're all fragile. It's okay to be fragile, vulnerable, weak. In fact, the place where you should most be able to recognise your fragility, open up about your weakness, bring your vulnerability is church. This is not the place for strong, together, all sorted world beaters any more than a hospital is a place for well people.

The key difference for Christians is the light. Paul not only talks of the fragility of these jars but he points out that it is in these jars of clay that God places his light. He chooses fragile vessels to transport his blessings and light up the world. (Imagine small, hand-made pots with a tea light inside.) They are nothing special in and of themselves and yet are beautiful because of the light that emanates from them. That's our challenge.

Paul says that these jars of clay are 'hard pressed on every side'. They get battered and cracked but they are not crushed and certainly not abandoned. You may feel crushed at times and when we forget that God is alongside us we can feel abandoned but actually these cracks simply allow the light (God's blessings) to flood out in more places. Just take a moment to look at the picture below. This particular pot is battered and cracked but the light still floods out and it's beautiful!



Life is throwing a lot at us at present and if you feel 'hard pressed on every side', know that you are not alone. God is with you. It's okay to have cracks and not be okay. You are not abandoned and will not be crushed, God's presence is with you like the tea light. And we're praying for you too.

Prayer Space

Lord,

you have exalted your name above the heavens. Your name means grace and peace and wonder to all who speak it in faith and love. You have chosen to use weak and broken vessels to be your eyes and hands and feet in this world. It seems, Lord, that you often pass your glory through the ordinary, the fragile, the imperfect. In this, Lord, we are honoured – but humbled.

You ask us to mirror grace, love and faithfulness to the world – the very grace, love and faithfulness eloquently displayed in Jesus Christ. Through him, you promise to give us all we need to live rich and holy lives in our communities, our families and in this world.

Mysterious God, what a great salvation. We sinned, you forgave. We turned away, you gave chase. We rebelled, you paid for it. We forgot, you remembered. We are often faithless, you are ever faithful. We complain, you are patient!

Lord, do not allow us to make excuses for ourselves, hiding as we do in the limits of our humanness. Although we are perfectly aware of how inadequate we are to the task, help us to see ourselves as you do, as reconcilers, as peacemakers, as redeemed kingdom builders. If we are dull, make us shine. Lord, take these imperfect jars of clay and make them to be holy cups of pure grace, forged in your desires for us.

Make it so.

Amen.
