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Simeon & Anna: Faithfulness in prayer but watchful anticipation

February 2nd sees the conclusion of the season of Epiphany with the celebration of Candlemas; the day 40 days after Christmas Day when we remember that Jesus was presented at the Temple as the law required. The events (as recorded in Luke 2:22-38) are remarkable because we are introduced to two characters, Simeon and Anna, who are stirred by the Holy Spirit; Simeon prophesies when he sees Jesus and Anna praises God.

Normally, whenever I have reflected on this passage to preach from it, I have been drawn to what Simeon says, how he prophesies that Jesus will be a light for all people in the passage (verses 29-32) known as the *Nunc Dimittis*, Latin for "Now let us depart". However, I have just come back from Ministers' Retreat where we focussed on unpacking the first two chapters of Luke's Gospel, and what I was struck by when looking at the presentation, was just how long Simeon and Anna had been faithfully praying for, and watching for both the Messiah and for the redemption of Israel.

The text does not say how old Simeon was or why he came to the Temple apart from he was righteous and devout. Tradition has said that he has been waiting a lifetime. Whereas the family history is provided for Anna in quite some detail, including that she is a widow and 84 years old, who never left the Temple but worshipped there with fasting and prayer night and day.

In Simeon and Anna we have two people who are faithful in prayer and who are watchful in anticipation, they are ready and waiting, with their eyes open to see what God is doing. I wonder how faithful we are in prayer, and how open we are to see God at work?

Last week I dropped my glasses behind the bed and to retrieve them I got out my spare pair, so I could see what I was doing. I don't wear my spare pair that often and so they were considerably cleaner and less scratched than my existing pair (I am going to the opticians for a long overdue appointment). However, I discovered that everything was so much clearer, I had a different perspective when I used my spare pair.

The importance of being faithful in prayer, is not to change God's mind but through prayer, for our minds to be changed and renewed that we may see things in a new way, from God's perspective. Prayer should not be a way that we bury our heads in the sand, but a way that we can see the world through God's eyes.

No matter how old we may be, let us be faithful in prayer, and let us have watchful anticipation that we may see and know what God is calling us to be and do as individuals, as churches and as a circuit.

Here am I

Online Circuit Service Sermon | Reading: Isaiah 6:1-8 & Luke 5:1-11 Revd Nathan Falla

"There is an old Christian tradition that God sends each person into this world with a special message to deliver, with a special song to sing for others, with a special act of love to bestow. No one can speak my message, or sing my song, or offer my act of love. These are entrusted only to me."

I love this quote from John Powell, because for me it says something of the nature of call which is individual, and that says God calls me to be me, to bring who I am in all that I do as I seek to serve to God. I don't necessarily need to go anywhere specific I just need to be who God calls me to be in the location where God has called me.

This does not mean however that God does not call people into specific paths of service, or to go to specific places, but it does mean that if we have said yes to God's offer of a relationship through Jesus Christ, then we are called to a whole life of discipleship, where day by day we become more like Jesus in every area of our lives. Discipleship is not an an optional accessory but is the golden thread of a life in Christ.

In our readings we have two accounts of people being called, both of which can help us as we explore what God is calling us to and to be. Isaiah sees a vision of heaven, a vivid picture with the Lord seated on the throne surrounded by six winged seraphs or angels all calling "Holy, holy, holy is the LORD Almighty; the whole earth is full of his glory" and he is so overawed that he cannot help but recognise his own weaknesses and his sinfulness; all the wrong things that he has done. The picture of holiness makes him see that he misses the mark, and he believes that he is ruined because in the Old Testament anyone who saw God face to face dies, he recognises that he is a man of unclean lips. Then there is the remarkable picture of a live coal being brought down by one of the seraphs and touching his lips, so his sin; all the wrong things that he has done and his guilt can be taken away. Isaiah hears the voice of the Lord, "Whom shall I send? And who will go for us? And Isaiah responds immediately, here I am, send me. Isaiah responds to this amazing sequence of events, not really knowing what he is saying yes to, but the first step has been made and all will be made known in the goodness of time.

In comparison to the high drama and heavenly visions of Isaiah's call, the call of Simon is much more every day and down to earth. Jesus comes to the lake but there are so many people who came to hear surrounding him that he asks Simon if he can use his boat to preach from, so that all could hear. After this Jesus asks Simon to go out into deeper water to catch fish, Simon is dismayed maybe a little annoyed because he had been trying to catch fish all night, but he had respect for Jesus and so let down his nets. There was then this wonderful haul of fish, so large that the nets were beginning to break and the boat being

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weighed down so much that another boat was called and still they struggled. When Peter saw this, he recognised that Jesus was special; he does not want to be in the same place as Jesus as he recognises that he is sinful. But then we have the wonderful words of Jesus: "Don't be afraid, from now on you will fish for people."

God's call can be very miraculous and stunning and it can also be very normal and every day, it can be a one-off event that stops us in our tracks and makes us think wow! It can also be a gradual process with different events making us think and when we put all the pieces together like a jigsaw then we realise that God is calling us.

God does call us; God calls each and every one of us into a relationship, to follow Jesus. God offers us an invitation, a free invitation, why? Because we are loved. When we first say yes to Jesus, like Isaiah and Simon Peter we have no idea where it may take us, as God calls us to follow, for God to be the compass for our lives, and to follow by serving in a whole variety of different ways.

When God calls us to a particular service, it is natural to think, how can I possibly do that? It is part of recognising that we are vulnerable people, we have faults and failings, but then we need to move beyond this, and hear Jesus' words "do not be afraid". We must not fall into the trap of using age as an excuse or time as an excuse, or anything else as an excuse, because excuses do not wash with God. God uses normal, everyday people and by grace transforms our weaknesses into amazing opportunities, for if God has called us to serve in a particular way then by the power of his Holy Spirit God is going to equip and enable us to fulfil that calling.

There is a danger that when we think about calling, that we think about the calling of others, our opening quote reminds us that everyone has a vocation; a message to deliver, a song to sing, an act of love. God calls for each of us to live every day for God, our work, our rest, our leisure to be Jesus to all that we meet.

What is your calling? To be more like Jesus where you are, where God calls you to be.

This Sunday (6th February) marks the 70th anniversary of the accession to the throne of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II. A life that has lived out the calling to serve others. This is a very public example of someone who seeks to be more like Jesus. But what about you?

Each of us in our own way, can be more like Jesus, through the Holy Spirit working in and through us. So let us recognise the call of God on our lives, let us not be afraid. God takes us and transforms our weaknesses so we become more like Jesus.

Yet she remains steadfast in her faith. We pray strength and good health for our Queen

Holy God of all power and saving grace, may we all feel your sustaining hand helping us through whatever lies ahead. Lead us as we are caught up in your story and tread the path laid out for us. Amen.
