Fishing on the other side

Reflections on Luke 5:1-11 by Rev Peter Hibberts

Ye done very little fishing in my time. I vividly remember a trip when I was in Fitzgerald, South Georgia in the mid nineties (as a young teen). I was invited by a church member to visit their 'pond' (which was local speak for a fully stocked fishing lake!) The chap took me out onto the pond in a tin boat with a rod each and 'lures' on the end of the lines to catch catfish (a South Georgian special). I have to say, it wasn't difficult. The Lake was so well stocked that if I'd reach into the water I would probably have felt several fish brushing against my hand. I have a wonderful picture of my catch, held at arms length towards the camera to make it look even bigger - proud as punch!

I have no idea what it is like for a professional fisherman, the type that crews a trawler in deep water, at night with huge nets (nowadays on motorised winches) let alone what it would have been like to be a fisherman like Peter, James and John in the time of Jesus' earthly ministry. Luke 5 catches a wonderful exchange between Jesus, James and John before they were even disciples. I wonder how many times they had put out their nets that night, faithfully casting the nets. They were certainly weary, disappointed and if the financial climate for them was anything like today, worried about making ends meet after coming to the shore empty handed.

I wonder if we're in a similar position as a church. It's not actually a COVID thing, but I think COVID has exacerbated it. You see we've been faithfully 'fishing' for so long. Many of you have been fishing in your church and community for the last 10, 20, 30 years (maybe more). Others have fished elsewhere for as many years. I wonder what that's looked like ... stewarding, leading, church councils, tea and coffee making, serving in community groups, perhaps leading worship and preaching, making repairs to church properties, giving of your hard-earned finances. I think many of us are weary, like the disciples were. We've had many 'catches' but I don't think church has ever been so difficult. We've tried so many things and perhaps we feel ready to pack in. (The disciples had given up fishing when Jesus met them!) But the message of this passage is that God wants us to trust him, and fish some more; on the other side of the boat. I wonder where your 'other side' is. Perhaps there's something in the life of your community or the life of your church family that God is asking you to be part of. He didn't call spectators, he called participators. Weary faithful and excited newcomers alike - let's trust God and put out our nets. God commands us to, God sustains us to, God equips us too; and may God unite us to.

Where is church?

Circuit Service Message | Matthew 5:13-16 | Rev Peter Hibberts

here were three ministers talking about their churches and the first one asked the others where their church was. The first talked about how their church was on the high street, near the shops. They talked about how it had a great glazed entrance that was visible amongst the shops and it meant that when the town was full of people they were able to get some passing interest from the shoppers. The second described his. It was a church that wasn't in the centre but it was next to a large housing estate and a school. They were enjoying being near the housing estate as they felt part of the community and were able to conduct assemblies in the school to invite the children to come to church. They were planning on having a Messy Church to get more children into church. The third sat back and thought for a moment. 'Where is your church?' the first and second ministers asked. 'Well, let's see,' said the third, 'It's about 9:30am on Monday morning, some will be just getting back from the school run, some will be just getting to work. I have one or two who volunteer at the local care home and some will be in school."

It's a challenge, isn't it. What is church?

We spend a significant amount of our time facilitating gathered worship (the hour or so we spend together on a Sunday morning or whenever). We worry about whether we've chosen the right songs, whether we've picked the right words for the sermon. We look at numbers and wonder if we're growing (or worry that we're not). We worry about if we're relevant as a church, connecting with community and so often we judge this on who comes to gather with us. I think sometimes that we're so busy maintaining the mechanism that we call church that we forget to be the organism that is church.

We're given two analogies here for what it means to be church (what it means to be disciples of Christ). Salt and Light.

You'll no doubt have heard many messages about what salt and light are, their characteristics and how we should be like them.

We can say a lot about salt and light. We can glean a lot from them as illustrations. But actually I don't think the most important lesson for today comes from their characteristics.

I have many salt containers in my kitchen, at home (a grinder a dish, pink salt, sea salt...) but they are nothing until they enter the food. I could collect salt containers, different salts, exotic, decorative... but they'd be pointless until they actually leave the salt cellar. They exist to leave the cellar and be used in the world. And Jesus even spells it out with the light. We don't collect light, store light, hold light. I have a wardrobe that has its own light, it comes on automatically when I open the door (like a fridge). It's clever because the light in my wardrobe is pointless until I open the door; if it came on when I closed the door and off when I

opened it, it would be a total waste of time and money!

Salt and light are both only any good when they leave the container. Yet when we talk about church we often get tied up either with the building or the activities we do together. We 'go' to church, or we 'attend' church so that's often how we picture it.

The salt is not the salt cellar, the light is not the bulb.

We should be spending more time considering who we are in Christ rather than what we do or the institution we belong to. But if what I'm saying is true then our gatherings need to change. They need to be about being in God's presence long enough to walk away brighter and saltier so that we can leave and brighten and season the world. They need to be about restoration together (like a spiritual hospital for the weary) about mutual support and accountability (learning and caring) and a place where we stay long enough to grow and be regularly planted out into the world where we really begin our worship.

I have some practical ideas for this. I'd like to see everyone who is part of our churches in a small group. A group that pastoral supports each other rather than designating those who visit. I'd like to see these groups co-lead (together) grass roots equipping grass roots to walk side by side, serve shoulder to shoulder, and lead on God and each other as we do. We need to think small (groups) as we dream big. Build the church bottom up, not top down. Then, as we gather, we excite, empower and equip each other as part of something bigger to scatter into our mission fields.

Our Gatherings should be simply to resource our scatterings, not the entirely of our church experience.

Pray with me and join me to challenge the institution that has made us weary to make it a place that is fit for purpose; pray with me and join me, to revolutionise what church is for us, to *be* the church wherever we are, shoulder to shoulder as a way of life. For the Creator's glory, in the Saviour's name and in the Spirit's power. **Amen.**
