Faith through prayer

suppose it is reasonable to assume that as individuals we will conduct our prayers in different ways and styles. Some will have the ability to use fine and righteous words that ring around the heavens in a majestic and stylistic manner, words just flowing off the tongue. A Rolls Royce of a prayer you might say. Some may be a little like me, less of a Rolls and more of an old banger when it comes to our daily devotions. Continuing with my analogy, it can be a little difficult some mornings getting the engine to start and to reluctantly admit to ourselves that maybe it could do with 'tuning up'.

A problem in my own case is that my prayer life can lack consistency, either feast or famine. Days or weeks can go by without consistent prayer and then something will probably happen. By consistent, I mean setting aside a specific time to go to God in prayer rather than fitting him in when we find it convenient. We learn of a tragedy, or hear a profound sermon in church. Something will come along that leads us into prayer. We engross ourselves in prayer, dealing with the situation that jolted us originally but after a while our life's journey continues but unfortunately, our prayers don't.

Our prayers can lack honesty, as we wonder if they can actually make a difference. Who am I to tell God anything if he knows all and controls everything? If that is true, why would Jesus have recourse to pray. Prayer to Jesus was his source of strength. It was a way of life to him, turning to prayer in every crisis no matter how great or small. There was no situation, or difficulty for him that would not yield to the power of prayer. Jesus prayed with a fervent passion because he knew who he was talking to, so they were powerful and not to be taken lightly. We witness this passion numerous times in the Gospels, culminating when he hung on the cross praying to his Father to maintain his spirit right to the very end.

In Mark , we read of a father with a sick child who was in need of a miracle offering a prayer to Jesus out of absolute desperation. 'If you can do anything for him, please have pity on us and help us.' Not a confident, or strong prayer was it? No, and certainly not a Rolls Royce, it has more of the old banger about it but nonetheless an honest old banger, an appeal to Jesus born out of a yearning to see the end of his son's suffering. So what led Jesus to cast out the spirit and heal the boy? Remembering that all prayers begin as a yearning, an honest appeal. As unremarkable as this was it was his prayer. It is the response from Jesus that is remarkable. The power is not in the quality of the prayer itself, the power is in the one who hears it. Jesus responded not to the eloquence of the man but to the pain of the man, to the honest prayer of a hurting man.

Since God is moved more by our hurt than by our eloquence, he responded, for that is what Fathers do.

We do not need to know when people are praying for us, or even who they are. It is sufficient to know that God will respond to those he knows who are hurting.


2.'Zoom' Opportunities

Glimpses of Glory

Circuit Service Message | Luke 9:28-36 | Rev Nathan Falla

ave you ever had such an amazing experience that you have never wanted it to end? A holiday that has been all that you have ever wanted it to be, a family occasion that brings out the best in everyone, an act of worship that enabled you to engage, hear and respond to God, where you were lost in wonder, love and praise? A truly mountain top experience that you have wanted to press the pause button so that you can hold on to a moment forever? The disciples are a bit like this in our reading today.

The events of the Transfiguration that moment of transformation when the glory of God is revealed and the three disciples; Peter, James and John gain a glimpse of Jesus in glory is truly awesome. It is no coincidence that Matthew, Mark and Luke in their accounts place this immediately after Jesus speaks of his death for the first time.

Commentators have seen the Transfiguration as a critical moment where Jesus' journey to Jerusalem and the cross is confirmed. Just as at the start of Jesus' ministry when he was baptised there was the voice from heaven so at this important junction we have the voice from heaven! The three disciples see the glory of God on the mountain top with Moses and Elijah, and will see God's glory on the hill of Calvary with the two robbers either side of Jesus.

Jesus withdraws to a quiet place with Peter & John, there is nothing unusual in that, Jesus models for us the need to re-charge our batteries and ensure that we are focussed on God. But what is unusual, is the transformation of Jesus' appearance, the appearance of Moses and Elijah (representing the law and the prophets), and the conversation they had with Jesus about his death.

This was a holy time, a time of great encounter, and though Peter and John were really tired they stayed awake for the duration. I wonder if they thought they were dreaming? Unsurprisingly Peter wants to hold unto this precious moment and suggests making three tents but then they are enveloped in a cloud and hear the voice from heaven, "this is my son, my chosen, listen to him."

I wonder, are we listening to God, are we trying to live on a mountain top when God is calling us to the valleys? It is wonderful to have mountaintop experiences of God, but God is also to be found in the everyday, in the pain and frustrations of life and these are times of transformation too.

Today in the church calendar we reach a junction, behind us is Christmas and Epiphany before us is the journey of Lent and in this place we are reminded of the glory of God. God's glory seen ISSUE 71 23-2-22

on the mountain top but we cannot live life on a mountain top! We have to come back down and live in the everyday.

The Revd Ruth Gee, in her presidential year 2013-14 encouraged the Methodist Church to see glimpses of God's glory, in the everyday. In her opening Conference address, she said:

"Waiting expectantly to glimpse the glory of God means waiting expectantly wherever we are and whatever the circumstances. This recognition of the presence of God is at the heart of mission and of evangelism which are surely about enabling people to recognise God already present with them, about introducing them to Jesus, about being the hands and feet of Christ in the world.

The calling of a church which waits expectantly for glimpses of God's glory is no easy calling. This is the calling to stand alongside people in pain and suffering and to offer something of the love of Christ This is the calling to recognise the presence of God in the mundane and the ordinary and to help others to find God there as well.

This is the call to recognise and respond to injustice. This is the call to challenge cruelty, indifference and violence as contrary to the will of God. This is the call to do everything we can to ensure that our places are safe places for children and the vulnerable, in the name of Jesus who welcomed the children and reached out to the marginalised.

This is the call to wait expectantly for glimpses of the glory of God even in our weakness. This is the call to follow the wounded and vulnerable Saviour knowing that we too may find ourselves wounded and vulnerable and finding glimpses of God's glory, even there."

Where do we see glimpses of God's glory? Where do we see God at work? Are we joining in?

The transfiguration was a moment of transformation. Today what in us needs to be transformed, what needs to be transfigured in the dazzling glory of God the light of God that illumines the dark places of our lives that we may truly glimpse and know the glory and love of God.

Are we seeing as God would have us see? Are we hearing as God would have us hear? Are we loving as God would have us love? Are we acting as God would have us act?

The disciples were told not to speak of what they had seen but we need to be bold in being witnesses of God's glory, making God's glory known through our actions and our lives. That the world may know God's love, and be transfigured and transformed. Amen.

Prayers for others

It's easy to see God's glory on the mountain top, but we live in a world full of valleys.

May we see your glory in the lives of those who live in the valley of poverty: poverty sustained by systems flawed by economic injustice, poverty that tears families apart

May we see your glory in the lives of those who live in the valley of conflict; conflict that rips communities apart, conflict that scars and maims long after the guns are silent.

May we see your glory in the lives of those who live in the valley of the shadow of death, where loved ones are desperately ill, where someone close has been taken from us.

May we see your glory in the lives of those live in the shadow of ill health, where the future is uncertain and decisions have to be made, where pain and infirmity make life so difficult.

May we see your glory in the lives of those who live in the valley of discrimination, discrimination that excludes, discrimination that despises and demeans.

Loving God, you showed your glory on the mountain top and on the cross, give us the vision to see your glory everywhere and give us the courage to bear witness to it for the glory of your name. **Amen.**
