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God's Justice - not ours.

Reflecting in week four of the LIVE LENT course 'Embracing Justice' - article by Rev Peter Hibberts

ur lent reflections continue alongside many across the country, on the subject of Justice. It's been a real eye opener as the many themes of justice in the Bible challenge what we may think justice is from a worldly perspective. We've been trying to reflect on what God's Justice might look like. (Actually it's been particularly poignant as we've also been watching all that's been unfolding in the Ukraine and praying for those affected. Who could have known when the studies were planned that it would be so relevant?)

As you may know, we began with a definition of justice. How would you define justice? Many of the folk in our groups used the word 'fairness'. It made me think about the statue that stands on the top of the Old Bailey, in London. The statue, entitled 'Lady Justice' is of a figure who holds in one hand a set of scales (the balance of fairness as calculating justice) and in the other a sword, symbolic of the tools for enacting justice where necessary (punishment?) For many of us justice is a calculation, if something is done that is wrong (unfair) by someone, then a punishment is due. In that sense the scales are re-balanced by a penalty. Actually we see this desire in society whenever there is a high profile crime; there is often a public outcry for justice that calls for a tough punishment to be handed out. But what if that's not the purpose of justice? What if it's not about punishment but something deeper?

In the Bible we see many different themes of justice but none so powerful as the person of Jesus. Jesus comes to Earth to bring justice (to right the wrongs that began at the start of creation with humanity turning its back on God). Not just that, but also to right the wrongs that have spiralled out of that rebellion and created the unjust world we live in now; the same world that Jesus walked on 2,000 years ago. Early in his ministry, Jesus read an ancient prophecy about himself from the Old Testament that said he was sent to proclaim good news to the poor, freedom to the prisoners, to set the oppressed free and we can see that if we read of his time on earth (in the gospels). Jesus spent time with the marginalised, the outcasts, those who were unjustly treated. But he also spent time with sinners (like me and you).

This is where he and Lady Justice part company. It's interesting that he and Lady Justice, from a distance, look alike - both cruciform (in the shape of a cross). But as Lady Justice reaches out her arms to calculate



our guilt and bring punishment, Jesus reaches out and takes a nail in each hand. Jesus chooses to take our punishment and justice becomes less about penalty and more about peace (and reconciliation).

The Easter message is one of righting the great wrong, reuniting us with God by the ultimate act of sacrifice and achieving a new justice where all become equal in God's eyes by his grace and mercy; challenging us to then bring justice in our world as part of God's Kingdom.

This Easter, reflect on what this means for you, personally. God's love, with outstretched arms, meeting us where we are, forgiving us and drawing us into his presence.


2.'Zoom' Opportunities

Relationship not Rules

Circuit Service Message | Exodus 19:1-6 | Rev Peter Hibberts

I've followed the Exodus story my lent reflections of the last few weeks and if you been at any of the churches I've preached at (or read articles/worshipped with the online worship) you'll have reflected with me on the journey God takes them on as he builds a relationship with them and builds them together as a community of justice. What we have is something of an readoption, despite God having a relationship with humanity in the very beginning, the result of the fall is that when God meets Moses in the burning bush, Moses does not even know what to call God; humanity has become estranged.

What are your family relationships like? The choices we make (and the choices of others) often put pressure on our relationships and sadly, sometimes we become estranged. I'm aware as I write this that Sunday is Mothering Sunday. It's a beautiful but often difficult day. Of course its origins are in 'Mother' churches but equally we see it as a chance to celebrate one of the most important relationships we know, that of mother and child. It's a day where many spoil their mother but equally anyone who has lost their mother, lost a child or become estranged will know it as a painful day. My prayers are with you if you find this weekend difficult.

At the point where we pick up this week's passage, the people of God have been rescued from slavery in Egypt and God has a plan for them that will lead ultimately to this estranged relationship becoming a special one again. The Israelites are at the base of Mount Sinai and we know they are about to receive possibly the most famous basis for justice in history: The Ten Commandments. (Are you, like one of the Southwell Members last week, picturing Charlton Heston?) These commandments are the basis of the law, the basis of justice and the basis of the way that Israelite society (and almost every society since) is built. But let's just hit the pause button. The point of today's message is not a reflection on rules. Often when we reflect on justice we look to the law, something that our studies into Biblical justice over the last few weeks has challenged. The law is important because it helps us to recognise when things have gone wrong, but it's not how to get things right, to make things just. In the Live Lent material that I'm studying both Justin Welby and Ruth Velerio made a similar point, that we seem to have an inbuilt compass that shows us when we've gone wrong (we know when things are not fair) but we seem to lack the compass that shows us how, as the human race, to navigate our way back to justice! That's because rules only get us so far. To have justice we need right relationships. If we are in a right relationship (built on love and compassion) we won't go far wrong. I can't help wondering whether we would see the difficulties we are seeing in Eastern Europe at present if over the decades since World War II we had fostered good relationships between East and West. One of the most damaging post war events was the building of the Berlin Wall. It signalled an inability to live side by side, to cooperate and be in right relationship. Even now, after the wall has been dismantled, the divisions between East and West can be seen (and felt by ordinary Ukranians caught in the middle). It's so tragic. Similarly tragic are the divisions that we feel in our own relationships and in our church when we can't journey together.

Back to the Israelites though. Before they receive the Ten Commandments, Moses ascends Mount Sinai to receive a message from God to the people:

"You have seen what I did...bore you on eagles' wings and bought you to myself." (Exodus 19:4)

What a beautiful analogy. What a beautiful picture of motherhood. God hears the cries of his estranged children in Egypt, he comes down to rescue them and take them like eaglets on his wings. (I was most disappointed to find eagles don't do this in real life but don't let that detract from the analogy - God certainly does carry us!)

This rescue and the restoration of the relationship is then highlighted in the rest of God's message:

"Now therefore, if you obey my voice and keep my covenant, you shall be my treasured possession."

Did you know that you are treasured by God? It was a relationship first given to the Israelites and then, through Israel (and then eternal work of Christ in dying on the cross) to all who choose to be part of it. Of course we still have free will and many times fail and break God's covenant but the cross ensures that we are only ever one step from God's forgiveness and restoration: repentance.

As I shared in the opening article, God's justice is markedly different to the world's justice. It's not about whether we measure up, it's about God's choice to build a bridge between where we should be (justice) and where we are. God chooses to restore us to right relationship and through that relationship we get reacquainted with God's voice (consider Jesus' picture of the sheep knowing the shepherd's voice) and can, through God's Holy Spirit find that compass to help us to act justly. Look with me just a few verses on in Exodus 19:8:

"Then the people all answered as one, 'Everything that the Lord has spoken, we will do"

If we are to see justice in our world, we must first be in right relationship with God, listening to God's voice and then rebuild those relationships with others. Perhaps we need to forgive and be forgiven, to bear one-another up on our wings. **Amen.**
