'We believe in life before death'

An article on Christian Aid Week 15-21st May 2022 by Rev Peter Hibberts

id you have to read the headline twice? We're perhaps more familiar with the statement, 'We believe in life after death.' (Which of course is also true!) That's why I think the Christian Aid strap-line that I'm quoting in the headline is so powerful. Yes Christ came to bring eternal life, but he also came to teach us how to live this side of death, to care for one another and bring God's Kingdom on Earth as it is in Heaven.

This week (15th-21st May) is Christian Aid week. You may have received an envelope through your door as armies of volunteers seek to raise funds for the many important projects that Christian Aid supports. This year the them is to 'Turn Hunger into Hope.'

I was chatting yesterday with one of the organisers in one of my communities and she said that with the Ukrainian appeal (which in and of itself is incredibly worthy and understandably grabbing our attention) many of the other plights are being overshadowed and risk being forgotten.

"This Christian Aid Week the story of Jessica Mwedzi from Zimbabwe is being told. She smiles with love for her children as she stirs a single bowl of porridge for them but she knows they're hungry for more. This one bowl of porridge is all she and her family can eat today: 'My children crave a decent meal, but I can't provide. We often go to bed on an empty stomach. It pains me to send them to bed hungry.'


For Jessica, drought means every day is a struggle for survival. Like many women in rural Zimbabwe - 7 out of 10 rely on farming for income and food - she toils on her farm, but nothing can grow on her ashen, dry land. Drought starves. Intensified by the climate crisis, and the effects of war in Ukraine on global food production, it drives families into hunger. Jessica recalls that 'One year, we had no rain. The scorching sun burnt my crops just as they were about to bloom. It was so painful and disheartening.'

It's unjust that drought - exacerbated by the effects of conflict and the global pandemic - robs Jessica of the power to provide for her family. Her husband is unwell, so she's the only breadwinner. Her children look up to her, but she has nothing left to give. Once before, when things were desperate, Jessica asked

her neighbours for food but she came home with nothing. But we can help, we can stand with Jessica and we can support the work of Christian Aid." (From christianaid.org.uk)

'Who are you?'

Circuit Service Message | Exodus 3:1-14 and John 6:29-35 | Rev Peter Hibberts

f, like me, you're a football fan, the headline above will carry a familiar chant like pattern and tune as it has at many a stadium with one set of fans goading the other... "Who are ya! Who are ya!" Identity is a huge thing. The BBC made great profit out of this very truth when they commissioned their celebrity ancestry series 'Who do you think you are?' In fact the ancestry industry in the USA alone was valued at \$3 billion in 2019 and is projected to be worth \$8 billion by 2026! Who we are is important to us. But should it be? Actually, if you ask John, the gospel writer, he would tell you that there's a more important question who is Jesus! It's no secret that I've found the last two years difficult, in life, in ministry - generally really. One of the things I've found hardest is unkind and judgmental words that still ring in my ears. Some may have been true, some were certainly not, but the devil uses these words to undermine us and pull us away from God. I'm resolving in the next seven weeks (along with some of the groups and congregations I lead) to pay less attention to the undermining words of the world and who they tell me I am, and more attention to who Jesus is and who he says I am. I'm going to ground myself in John's gospel where we are directed to seven key truths about Jesus. Will you join me?

Before I delve into John, let me just take a few moments to think about the common point in all of these... 'I am.' To understand the magnitude that these two simple words carry we need to go all the way back to Moses in the desert and to the burning bush. If you were asked who you are, what would you say? If you were asked to say who God is, what would you say?

Moses found himself in this position as he faced the burning bush. God meets Moses and reveals to him that he will send him to bring his people out of captivity. What is Moses' response? Understandably he feels inadequate for such a task and replies "Who am I?" Interestingly enough, God doesn't follow this by listing Moses strengths and gifting (that's what I might have done to encourage someone into service). Instead God says, "I will be with you." Genius.

God knows that Moses success will never be about who he is or what he can do but it's about who God is and what God can do. That's true for you also. What are you facing? Is it, at times, overwhelming? Me too. Choose, instead of focusing on what lies ahead, or how you're not up to the task, look around and notice that God is with you.

Maybe, like Moses, you need a little extra reassurance. Moses at least accepts that this is his task because he next says, "Suppose I go...who shall I say sent me." The response is so incredibly powerful that for millennia it has been used as the actual name of God. It's so special that the Jews dared not speak it aloud and when it was written, the vowels were omitted to keep it sacred - in fact we cannot be sure of the vowels now as there is no written record of them!

God simply says, "I am."

In Hebrew is it YHWH and when we speculate at the missing vowels we get Yahweh, from which, as a Latin version, we get Jehovah.

It's an incredible statement though. God simply is. And that's all we need.

One of my favourite Christian tracks is the <u>Casting Crowns track</u>, 'Who <u>am I'</u>. If you get chance, listen to it. It holds the brilliant lyrics: *Not because of who I am, But because of what You've done, Not because of what I've done, But because of who You are.* This is how we face life.

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And with that in mind, let's press on. Who is this 'I am'? Well of course, it's God the trinity, of whom the embodiment is Jesus. Jesus who also said 'I am,' seven times:

I am the bread of life (John 6:35), I am the light of the world (8:12), I am the door (10:7), I am the good shepherd (10:11, 14), I am the resurrection and the life (11:25), I am the way the truth and the life (14:6) and I am the true vine (15:1).

Could you have named them without looking? Which is the one you find the most powerful?

I am the bread of life (John 6:35)

Perhaps we start well with this one, especially if this message comes as a lifeline in a time when you are hungry, or thirsty. If you are spiritually malnourished at this time, here Jesus say I am the bread of life.

Few things are more of a crisis than the Hibberts family running out of bread! We have so many bread products that are always on our shopping list (wraps, pittas, sliced - white and wholemeal, bagels, muffins...) and bread is rarely thrown away. It's a staple food throughout the world. It's the food (unleavened) that the Israelites took with them when they fled, it's the food that God provided in the wilderness, it's the food that many an army has marched on and it's the food that represents the body of Christ in the most sacred of our rituals, communion. When we meet, we literally and figuratively break bread.

One of the most beautiful words we have in the English language is the word companion. 2022 has been dubbed the year of loneliness; isolation or loneliness has been one of the hardest parts of the last two years, many of you may still feel alone or isolated. You will probably know that during lockdown, we got a dog (many did) and this week Wesley is I year old. He is a wonderful companion. (As I prepare this, he's curled up behind me in my study at SMC.) I find his mere presence lifting (when he's not stealing my slippers!)

Did you know that companion literally means 'one who breaks bread with another.' 'Com' is from the Latin meaning together and 'panis' from the Latin for bread.

Let me tell you then, from these truths, that the most fulfilling food we can encounter is the presence of Christ. It is by the literal breaking of Christ's body, figuratively the breaking of bread as Jesus is the bread of life, that Jesus seals himself as our eternal companion. You are never alone. When Jesus chose to come and walk the Earth, as God taking on flesh and humanness, he was the ultimate manna (bread of heaven). Then, when he chose to walk the way of the cross and was crucified he took all of the things that separate us from him and isolate us from God (we often call these sins - the mistakes we've made in life) and he took them into the grave. When he rose again on the third day, from actually, physically dead to actually, physically alive again, he left those separators behind. We are forgiven. We are reconciled one again with God! Hallelujah!

Here we come full circle. You see Yahweh is with us! God, the I am, goes with us, just as he did with Moses. When you struggle, look around and know that God is with you, God has got you. But just remember - like the Manna in the wilderness, it needed to be collected daily, we need our daily bread - daily tome with Jesus in prayer, worship, study. How will you break bread today? Have you stopped, noticed and communed with Jesus today?

Prayers

Great 'I am', May we know that you are with us whatever we face, that you walk alongside us in all that you call us to. Help us to remember that our walk with you is not dependent in who we are or what we have done, but it built upon who you are and what you have done.

May we know you as the bread of life, know your companionship day by day and grow as we feed on you as our daily bread. Help us to make space to commune with you daily. Lead and guide us by you spirit, in the name of Jesus and for your eternal glory. **Amen**
