I've heard many folk say that they are craving a hug, from the grandchildren, a non-cohabiting partner or even a wife or husband that has been separated due to a need for shielding.

Perhaps in recognition of that, about three weeks ago, FaceBook supplemented its 'Emojis' (buttons a user can click onto to show their emotional reaction to something they've read) with two new Covid-19 emojis. FaceBook users are used to the thumbs up (like); heart (love); laughing, shocked or angry faces, but now can choose 'care' (pictured below as a face hugging a heart or a beating heart. I find it interesting that folk (at least in the mind of FaceBook) need ways to express emotions like this - especially when apart. I think it's because we're all a 'work of heart'. It was for love and by love that God created us, never to be isolated (that's why the expulsion from the Garden of Eden hurt, God and us, so much - check out Genesis, in the Bible.) We each carry the image of God and because God is love, at our best so are we.

If you are needing a hug right now (or need to give one!) then I hope during this lockdown you can still



find a way. Perhaps it'll be electronic, maybe it'll be over the telephone or perhaps, if you're able it will be a socially distanced act of kindness. The spirit alongside us

John 14.15-21 (NRSV)

he knowledge that God is with us has been a great comfort for many during these times of isolation but when we hear of the relationship(s) that are possible, for those who are disciples of Christ, I don't think it can be overstated!

I've joined many loyalty schemes in my time, some of which have delivered and others haven't been worth the flimsy card you get when you join. With Christian discipleship the benefits far outweigh the commitment we make (and often break, if I'm honest). As disciples of Christ (here described as 'keeping [his] commandments' - meaning it's can be us as well as the original disciples) we get an amazing package: an eternal advocate who abides with us constantly; parenting from the God who created everything; sight of the risen Christ; and the constant love of God, that same creator. More than that we are promised a future point when we will *see* Christ our Lord and redeemer once again. Not bad really!

Here the focus is on the 'Advocate'. But first comes the reality that they will be left; that Jesus will soon be separated from them. I wonder what the disciples made of that. What would they want do with their remaining time with Jesus? What would *we* have done with our final excursions, in the weeks preceding lockdown had we known what was ahead? (Hopefully not spent it stock-piling toilet rolls!) What might we have done with our last pre-lockdown church experience, if we'd known it would be so long before the next one? (Given out hymn books to take away, distributed resources for home worship?)

Then there follows the revelation that they would not be left alone ('not orphaned'). In fact it's more than that: Jesus tells us that *be* will be coming to them in a way that the *world* will not see. In short Jesus' presence will still be there for his disciples (that's us) but in a different way. It's genius really, when you think about it. Jesus, limited geographically, was the greatest teacher of all time and had given himself almost exclusively to twelve chosen individuals; but now, following his death and resurrection, he could be the teacher and advocate to unlimited numbers! (In fact, as estimates would have us believe, he is now simultaneous teacher to 2.18 billion folk worldwide!) That said, it's definitely different. We don't 'see' Jesus in the same way (though we will). How can we expect this to work then? Well, (spoiler alert) we're about to spend a number of weeks exploring the role of the Holy Spirit, leading up to and beyond Pentecost, and as we look at the New Testament, we see this relationship lived out. The disciples (that's us too) are empowered beyond imagination, accompanied through the hardest of times, joined together in new and incredible ways and (perhaps most importantly) given the toughest of tasks to perform. In essence that's Christianity, that's what we're all called to.

This passage sets us up with an incredible challenge but also encourages us that we're equipped beyond our wildest dreams.

Never before, at least in living memory, have we faced such a lockdown, as communities or as the church and none of us really knows what to do. Some heroic acts are being undertaken both inside and outside the church right now and folk are really stepping up to the plate. Equally, we're all living with a level of disillusionment, it feels like such a long time and like it may be an even longer time yet. But God *is* with us. *He* is our 'advocate'.

Let me conclude, then, by looking into what that word 'advocate' means. In the Greek (the original New Testament language) it's 'parakleton' which is here (in the New Revised Standard Version - NRSV) translated as 'advocate'. Parakleton is made up of 'para' meaning alongside (like a paramedic is alongside a doctor or a parachute alongside a skydiver) and 'kleton' meaning to call. It's literally 'one who is called to be alongside' [you]. In various translations it has come to mean comforter, counsellor, helper and, here, advocate. It is one who is called to your aid, to work on your behalf. Imagine that. Amidst all this, and anything else the world may throw at you, there is another constantly working for you, never sleeping, never off-duty and not socially distanced. 'He' is not off work because he's shielding, he on duty shielding you.

Interestingly enough, in law, one of the most basic rights is legal counsel. When you're in the worst of predicaments you can ask for an audience with your lawyer, and if you don't have one, one is provided. Just remember that. This is where translating the Holy Spirit as advocate is at its most powerful. **However bad this** gets, however desperate or alone you feel, you always have the right to have an audience with your advocate (who just happens to be the creator of Heaven and Earth). All you have to do is talk walk him. <u>www.TryPraying.org</u>
