Are you on a Coronacoaster?



I'm told that several new words are entering the English language under the category 'Lockdown Lingo'! Perhaps you're suffering from a 'Caronadose' - an overdose of bad news during the crisis; perhaps you're developing 'Le Creuset wrist' - a complaint that results from carrying large times of kitchenware into the street to bad on a Thursday evening in appreciation of key workers? Maybe you're developing 'Blue Skype thinking' - developing wonderful ideas from the comfort of an online meeting (also known as a 'Zoomposium'). Maybe you're noting a 'Covid-10' - that's the ten extra pounds in weight that you've put on by comfort eating in the absence of exercise! And have you noticed all the new 'Quentin Quarantino's who have emerged as online film-makers during the lockdown. Is it all becoming quite a 'Carona-coaster'? (You're loving lockdown one minute but suddenly weepy with anxiety the next.)

This crisis is certainly the midwife of a lot of new things. For the Hibberts family, it's given rise to a family meeting. We've been starting each day together, around the kitchen table, with a look ahead to the day and a time of prayer together. (It may shock and disappoint you to know that we didn't do that anyway but we are just a normal family!) Olivia and Joseph have also started to read with their Nana in Stoke on Trent (via FaceTime - video calling). I have to say we could have easily done the online reading time with grandparents prior to the lockdown but somehow this time seems to have galvanised some new behaviours. Nationally we've started valuing our key workers (we have signs on our bin lids thanking our refuse collectors; we have a sign on our letterbox thanking the postie; and going out of our way to show gratitude to those previously taken for granted).

What new things are you doing as a result of the crisis? I think birthing is an interesting concept to think about right now. Birth is painful (or so I'm told - and indeed have observed) and we don't chose that pain, but out of the pain of childbirth comes something amazing. We haven't chosen this virus and I'm not suggesting it's a good thing, but it could be the midwife of some amazing transformations. Crisis and trauma are often transformative and we have every reason to have hope,

1 even in these difficult times. **God is in control, God has a plan, God is faithful. There is hope.**

Which way now?

John 14:1-14

This week we focus on one of the most famous passages of scripture for Christians. It speaks of direction, truth and life and the answer to all three is Jesus! At a time when we are looking for the way to tackle this virus, we are surrounded by conflicting claims - perhaps finding truth a rare commodity - and where our very lives are threatened, this passage perhaps speaks of fundamental questions now more than even.

It's ironic that, right now, I'm in need of directions less than I ever have been. I haven't accessed my maps app for around five weeks (I have barely found myself behind the wheel of the car in that time). That said, I have been considering, at great length, the way forward for the church both in lockdown and following lockdown. Indeed we all need to consider our direction as what was normal has gone and will likely never return - indeed do we really want to go back to the way things were after our eyes have been forced open to so much! We need to reflect now on what we want life and church to look like when we are able to move freely again. I think we also each need to consider our values, personally, following this transformative experience. We will all be different, so what do we want to be?

The disciples were facing a transformative point. It was an acid test. After years with Jesus they were to be without him and the truth would be known as to how much they had changed as a result. Would they know the way without Jesus? Jesus is rightly annoyed when they seem to have learned nothing! Jesus' aim was to lead them to the father, directly, and in doing so create a body of disciples who could be the foundations of the church that we know two thousand years later. Discipleship breeds disciples who can continue the work when the teacher is no longer present.

This experience has made me wonder what church has been achieving. How long have you been a churchgoer? In that time, what effect has it had on you? I hope that the church has sustained you spiritually during your time, and in one sense that is a great accomplishment, but when the support of the church is removed,

are you left with nothing, or do you know how to worship, serve and walk with your God even when you can't do it *at* church? If you're a new Christian, then perhaps this lockdown came at a bad time (Is there ever a good time?), a fledgling bird is not pushed from the nest until it is ready to fly. However if you are a lifelong churchgoer then, as a disciple of Christ, you should be able to continue in faith without the church building as a scaffold. Don't get me wrong, I'm not saying the church (community) is worthless - it's through church that we mutually support each other, challenge one another and hold each other accountable to discipleship. But if you find yourself unable to pray, worship God or deepen your faith in scripture without a Sunday service then I'm sorry, we've failed you as a church. If in all your churchgoing you have not connected with 'the Father' then we've not fulfilled our primary purpose.

The way, in all this, and for us as a church is *Jesus*. We need to each connect with *Jesus* directly and if you've never done that, can I encourage you to stop reading this and ask Jesus to show you the way to the Father, even now. The truth is *Jesus* - not the latest mission strategy, the latest area of service or the latest worship fad. It is *Jesus'* example that we follow and it is only through *Jesus* that we find life.

Fortunately, if you've not connected directly with Jesus through Church, it's not a problem. Even in lockdown, Jesus is with you and you don't need an 'alter call' (to put it in old fashioned terms) to respond. Spend some time now, and if you need further support have a look at the song suggestions or pick up the phone and I'd love to pray with you. But don't be like the disciples, asking to be shown the father, look at Jesus and see all you need to see.

I for one intend to reassess the way I do church, post lockdown, and I invite you too to reflect on what church is and should be. I intend to build a church that takes seriously its mission to lead people to God first and foremost. No-one will be part of our church forever and so we should not be dependent on our church or our church leaders for our spiritual health. Instead we each need to connect with God directly and as a church we must make that our primary focus. I invite you to pray for the church to emerge from this chrysalis as the butterfly God created us to be.

Finally, take heart from the last line of today's passage. Jesus is with us and says, "You may ask me for anything in my name, and I will do it." This is a quite remarkable thing for Jesus to say to his disciples - let's not miss it! Let's ask that God transform the church and reach out to heal our nation.




Storytime!

Read the story, 'We're going on a Bear Hunt' with the children (it is available on Youtube if you don't have the book!), encourage interaction! Ask your child what they would need if they wanted to get somewhere a long way away. Hopefully one of the suggestions would be a map or sat nav! We need to know how to get where we're going and a map or sat nav might help us but there's something that might be even better. Can you think what? The best thing to have is someone who's been there before! When climbers go up Everest, they take a guide with them - someone who's done it before - who knows the best way to go and where the dangerous bits are. All of us are on a journey of getting to know God better. It's a journey that can last forever! But we need to make sure that we know where we're going. In the Bible, Jesus says this: "I am the way." He knows God better than anyone - because he is both completely God and completely man so he knows how to help us to know him too. If we make Jesus our personal guide, he'll show us the way on the journey and we'll get closer and closer to God. What kind of things might Jesus show us on the way? (Risks, danger points, things to learn from...) That's why we talk about following Jesus - you only follow someone if you're sure they know where they're going!

Craft Activity:

If you're feeling brave, let the children make painty footprints on a piece of paper (have them sitting down, not standing as paint can be extremely slippery!). Clean their feet! They can write "I follow Jesus because he is the way" on their picture.
